## Let's Read continues to grow

The Let's Read program continues support a range of literacy initiatives across the Wimmera Southern Mallee. It is great to see schools share and adopt best practice programs. More than 3000 Let's Read resource bags have been distributed to families across the region.

There are now more than 90 Pop Up libraries located in 14 Wimmera communities. The Pop Up libraries are tubs of books situated in doctor's waiting rooms, playgroups, MCHN centres, Centrelink, Salvation Army, chemists, shops and other locations that families visit. Families can borrow a book and keep it for as long as they like. This initiative is based on the successful Warracknabeal WORDS group Pop Up library model. Students at many Wimmera schools have undertaken school projects to set up the Pop Up libraries in their communities. The students arrange a book drive, advertise, collect books, brand them and set up the libraries in 'family friendly' locations in their town.

The Nhill Lutheran Primary School has worked with the WSMLLEN to develop eight dual language (English-Karen) children's books. Students wrote and illustrated the books, which were launched by the Mayor at a book launch attended by more than one hundred people.

Early years programs are being implemented across the region to build the capacity of parents to support their children's language and literacy development. For example, Rainbow P-12 College, Warracknabeal, Hopetoun and Nhill Primary Schools have implemented a 'Shake Rattle and Read' program (or similar) for young families at the school. This program supports families through the sharing of rhymes, songs, and storybooks with their pre-school children. The program teaches rhymes for parents to use daily with their child/children from birth to kinder age in a fun and interactive way.



## Kevin Sheedy gets 'hands on'

It was great to see four Wimmera schools represented at the Hands on Learning (HOL) conference last week. Mal Smith (Rainbow P-12 College), Luke Carr (Horsham College), Greg McKinnon (Warracknabeal Secondary College) and Wal Ferguson (Hopetoun P-12 College) joined with the HOL team and artisan teachers from schools in Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland. The conference gave participants an opportunity for artisan teachers to share project ideas and successes. Participants also undertook a series of professional development workshops focused on Youth Mental Health First Aid and student well-being.

A feature of the conference was a great presentation from Kevin Sheedy. 'Sheeds' is a great advocate of the Hands on Learning program and stressed the importance of supporting our young people to succeed and enjoy a better life. Kevin is a strong believer in the power of mentors and challenged the group to support and inspire the young people that they worked with.

## More than gum boots and tractors – snapshot of careers in agriculture



Year 9 and 10 science students were treated to a feast of potential career opportunities with a tour of Grains Innovation Park, Longerenong College and Bayer CropsScience, as part of a 'More Than Gumboots and Tractors' science tour centred around agriculture.

Sessions gave students a snapshot into Ag Science related careers and exposed them to a number of leading research and development facilities based in Horsham.

Coinciding with Science week, 62 students from Horsham College, St Brigid's and Dimboola Memorial Secondary College visited 5 different sites including the Australian Grains Genebank, Victorian Phenotyping Glasshouse and Grains Pathology Laboratories and Bayer CropsScience's wheat and canola breeding centre at Longerenong College.

The day was a collaboration between WDA and WSMLLEN, supported with a travel subsidy through the Victorian Wheat Research Foundation.

## Operation Flinders – hats off to Victoria Police



## VET Induction Day 26<sup>th</sup> October, 2016



VET Induction Day will be held on 26 October for all students enrolling in the first year of a 2017 VET course offered by the WSMVET Cluster.

This day is a 'trial run' for students. It is an introduction to their course and an opportunity for students to negotiate the transport system to get to their courses. It is important that all students attend their Induction Day. Literacy and numeracy tests will be conducted to establish the level of support that students may need.

**All students undertaking a VET course must have a Unique Student Identifier (USI) to enrol in their course. Students should have their USI number with them when attend the VET Induction Day on 26 October and on the first day of their course in 2017.**
